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CHCS Maintains a Covenantal Approach to Christian Education

A covenant is a serious commitment. While the marriage covenant is the most widely recognized, a covenant of any kind is essentially a

binding agreement to do or refrain from doing something based on its terms. In Christian education, a covenantal relationship means the school partners with families in raising children with a biblical worldview, nurturing those already being discipled at home and in church. Chapel Hill Christian School has upheld this covenantal approach for nearly sixty years.

A Covenantal school prioritizes training children already being raised in Christian households, ensuring consistency between home, church, and school teachings. Typically, at least one parent must be a professing Christian and active in a local church. At Chapel Hill, our goal is to forge a strong partnership between home, church, and school. We do not seek to exclude those who do not fit a certain mold; rather, we choose to partner with families who align with our biblical values and commitment

to discipleship. Families who are not wholly committed to the Gospel and a lifestyle consistent with our *Parent Covenant* may create an environment of confusion for their children, receiving mixed messages between home and school. In addition to providing academic excellence, we remain steadfast in our commitment to **Biblical Integration and spiritual formation**, just as we did when Chapel Hill first opened its doors in 1966.

From the very beginning, our Mission has centered around Loving God,
Academic Excellence, and Discovering God's path for the future—now encapsulated in our motto: Love, Learn,
Launch. It is critically important to us that our students develop an authentic relationship with Christ, cultivate a love for learning, and discover their divine purpose.

While we do not seek to exclude anyone, admitting a student who does not meet our academic standards could be detrimental to their success and confidence. Similarly, enrolling a family whose values do not align with ours could create internal conflict for a child, leaving them

torn between the teachings of their parents and those of our school. Our goal is not to override the teachings of the home, but rather to support them in harmony with the church.

Many Christian schools today have adopted an evangelistic model, which is both honorable and important. These schools often aim to be more inclusive, welcoming students from non-Christian families to introduce them to the Gospel. We deeply respect and appreciate our brothers and sisters in Christ who are answering this call. However, understanding our own calling—both individually and corporately—is just as crucial. Since opening in 1966, Chapel Hill has remained steadfast in its covenantal approach, forging deep partnerships with families. Our logo, the Triangle, represents this bond between the home, church, and school. As we seek to foster an environment where children fall deeper in love with the Lord, develop a passion for learning, and pursue God's purpose for their lives, we are committed to ensuring they are surrounded by a supportive, faithaligned community.

Each year, CHCS sixth-graders have the opportunity to embark on a mission trip to Guatemala to serve at the Amigos School and meet their sponsored students. This year, five sixth-grade girls from the North Campus, along with their families, decided to participate. The journey leading up to the trip was filled with many emotions: excitement, nervousness, anticipation, curiosity, a sense of adventure, slight anxiety, and even a bit of fear due to the unknown. These are common feelings for many traveling outside the U.S. for the first time.

As the group prayed before heading to Guatemala, it was beautiful to witness how God took all of these emotions, met each person where they were, and responded in such a wonderful way.

Excitement

The girls were thrilled to finally meet their sponsored student, Jeremmy. Over the years, they had connected through video calls and exchanged many letters, but meeting him in person was a special moment. They were overjoyed to visit his home, sit with him, and learn more about his life and his family. At first, Jeremmy

was shy, but as the group interacted with him, he gradually opened up. They learned that Jeremmy loves to draw, has a cat and a dog, enjoys learning about science and the solar system, and isn't fond of sports. One of the girls later shared that visiting Jeremmy's house was one of the highlights of the trip.

Nervousness

For the sixth-graders, everything was new: the school, the house where they stayed, the children they met, and even the food. Coming to a different country was intimidating, and they weren't sure what to expect. But God answered their prayers right away. As they settled into the CHM house, enjoyed a nice lunch, and spent time with Alvaro (a former sponsored student who helps with translation for groups in Guatemala), they began to feel at home. They had heard many stories about Alvaro and were thrilled to finally meet him in person.

Anticipation

Leading up to the trip, there were many questions about what Guatemala would be like. Would they get along with everyone in the blue house? Would they be able to serve with happy hearts during the long days? The sixth-graders exceeded all expectations. They got along incredibly well with their classmates throughout the trip. There was no arguing or bickering, and they were always eager to help, whether it was setting the table, washing dishes, or assisting with ministry tasks in preparation for meetings. There was a lot of laughter and joy in their service.

One concern was how they would connect with the children in Guatemala, especially because of the language barrier. They weren't sure how they would communicate, but were pleasantly surprised when they brought out their activities and were instantly surrounded by a group of smiling Guatemalan children. The girls were amazed to see how happy the children were, despite having so little. The children had so much fun with the simplest things—sidewalk chalk, coloring pages, bracelets, and games. As they entered classrooms to teach English, some of the children greeted them with hugs. The sixth-graders were in awe, remarking that such warm greetings would be uncommon in the U.S.

Overall, the sixth-grade trip to Guatemala was a great success. The girls learned that God is with them wherever they go and will help them through any situation. They cherished their time in Guatemala, interacting with the students and visiting homes. They reflected on how much they have back home and realized how easy it can be to take things for granted. After spending time with the children in Guatemala, they saw the world in a new light. May God continue to use the experiences they shared to shape and mold them into young women who love Jesus and are eager to serve Him wherever they go.
